
Grade 2 Information 2023

Punctuality

Bell rings at 8:50am

Children are expected to play outside before school and when the bell rings they walk into their classroom ready to commence our morning routine at this time. It is important that children arrive by 8.50 because we begin work as soon as they come into the classroom.

We begin the day with different activities such as:

- change our home reading book and practise reading the book
- revise spelling words or incidental spelling
- counting patterns or revision of number skills
- hand in library book and bag weekly
- complete any unfinished activities from the previous day

- Talk to your child about possible activities or games they can play.
- A sports bin is provided for each classroom. Students are responsible for this equipment.
- If they come home with negative comments about incidents, turn the situation around and teach them a positive using our Whole School Positive Behaviour skills
- If your child continually complains about situations please contact your classroom teacher.











Food at school

- Rubbish free lunches where possible to reduce litter on the playground.
- Reusable containers need to be labelled.

We encourage students to eat a piece of fruit &/or vegetables during our

daily fruit breaks.

Water bottles must be clearly named.

In regards to children's birthdays, if you wish to send something in for their classmates, can you please ensure it is individually wrapped or packaged. These treats will be sent home at the end of the school day.

- Correct school hat.


Please message your classroom teacher if your child is unable to come to school in the correct school uniform.

Homework - Home Reading

How to read with your child at home. Read level books. These should be easy books.

Have a short conversation with your child about the book they have read. Identify the characters and the setting. Ask a couple of questions about what your child has read. i.e What was the problem in the story? Read to your child at home interest books, newspapers and magazines. *Create a routine at home to ensure the book bag comes back to school daily.* Please record the date, title and fill in the number of nights section, so we can give out stickers when a milestone is reached. Ignore the days, just fill in the next line.



Homework -

• Reading every night. Children are expected to bring their reader bags with their yellow diary to school everyday and change their 'good fit' books each morning.



- A simple maths task will go home each week. This will include revision of concepts already taught. Children have the entire week to complete it.
- Spelling and reading of words from the word list in their yellow diary.

Please contact us via Class Dojo or personally if reading or Maths is difficult at home.





Library - each class has a weekly 45 minute session with Mrs McKenna

- → Understanding parts of a story characters, setting and storyline.
- → Distinguish between fiction and non fiction texts.
- → Use shelf markers independently
- → Each week students have story time, discussion, reading response, borrowing and quiet reading.
- → The students are expected to bring a library bag to borrow each week.
