
Please also send a drink bottle every day with water.

# Whole School Approach to Positive Behaviour (WSAPB)




WSAPB is an approach that promotes positive behaviours throughout our learning community.



In grade 1 we explore one of our WSAPB expectations fortnightly. We explore these expectations through stories, activities and discussions all of which help the students gain a better understanding of what these expectations mean and how we can promote them within our learning community. At the end of focus each Grade 1 teacher will choose 2 students from their class who has displayed the particular behaviour the most, these students will be awarded a leaf to put on the WSAPB tree in our shared learning space.







# Core Curriculum: Religious Education



St Ita dedicated herself to prayer, fasting, simplicity and spirituality. St Ita's life reflects many of our gospel values; be faithful, be caring, be of service and be peaceful. Her feast day is 15th January


This term we begin with 'We Belong'.

We then continue our learning about Prayer. During this unit we identify the special ways we can talk to God. We will practise the 'Hail Mary' and 'Our Father', and learn new prayers and songs.

Our Whole School Approach to Positive Behaviors (WSAPB) posters each have a scripture link to the Bible; the children learn that our behaviours can be modelled on the example given by Jesus in the Gospels.

On Ash Wednesday (22nd February in 2023) we will begin our learning about Lent and Easter, including the events of Holy Week.











## Core Curriculum: Religious Education

Our classrooms at St Ita's School each have a prayer table on which there is a crucifix (a Cross with the crucified body of Jesus), a Bible, a candle and other small religious items such as Rosary beads and holy pictures. We sit close to this table as a focus, during prayer times.

In Grade One, we pray and sing songs each morning, lunchtime and afternoon, to praise and thank God for all that we have, for our food and the people who prepare it for us, and for the day we have shared.

Our children especially enjoy the traditional Grade One Prayer (see following slide).

We attend Mass at 9:30 am in St Ita's Church on a rostered system once or twice a term.

We also make visits to the Church to sit quietly in prayer, to learn how to genuflect in the Catholic tradition, and to observe and learn about the Tabernacle, altar, baptismal fount, the Stations of the Cross and other items in our sacred space.









Soon each class will start sending home a Prayer Bag, on a rostered basis, so that each Grade One student has the opportunity to set up a little space at home, for prayer with the family. The Prayer Bag will contain items similar to our class Prayer table, Students and families will also have the option of writing a prayer in the book provided; these prayers will be used in classroom prayer. This has proven an absolute favourite activity for the children in the years prior to the Covid Pandemic.

## Core Curriculum: Mathematics





Throughout Grade 1, students use mathematical symbols and language as well as materials and drawings in their mathematical explorations of daily life.

Students recognise, represent and order numbers to at least 100 using materials, diagrams, words, numerals and a number line, and apply this with respect to the value of Australian coins. They group and skip count by twos, fives and tens, and count to 100 by partitioning and using place value. Students solve simple addition problems, and share into two equal groups or parts to model one-half.


Students use uniform informal units to measure and compare length and capacity. They tell time to the half-hour and use time and calendar terms such as hours, days, weeks and months to describe duration. Students use terms such as corner, edge and face to classify familiar shapes and objects, and are able to give and follow directions to familiar locations.

Students use one-to-one correspondences to display categorical data obtained from a simple investigation. They identify chance events in familiar contexts and use everyday language such as 'will happen', won't happen' or 'might happen' in relation to these.





## Core Curriculum: English

Throughout grade 1, students engage with a variety of texts for enjoyment. They listen to, read, view and interpret spoken, written and multimodal texts designed to entertain and inform. These encompass traditional oral texts including Aboriginal stories, picture books, various types of stories, rhyming verse, poetry, non-fiction, film, dramatic performances, and texts used by students as models for constructing their own texts.

Literary texts that support and extend Level 1 students as independent readers involve straightforward sequences of events and everyday happenings with recognisably realistic or imaginary characters. Informative texts present a small amount of new content about familiar topics of interest and topics being studied in other areas of the curriculum. These texts also present a small range of language features, including simple and compound sentences, some unfamiliar vocabulary, a small number of high-frequency words and words that need to be decoded phonically, and sentence boundary punctuation, as well as illustrations and diagrams that support the printed text.

Students create a variety of imaginative, informative and persuasive texts including recounts, procedures, performances, literary retellings and poetry.

## Sport

This year in Grade 1 Physical Education, students will be learning and practising fundamental movement skills such as kicking, bouncing, throwing and catching. They will be learning to identify rules and fair play. Students will be playing a variety of invasion games with a range of equipment. Students will learn about spatial awareness and cooperating as part of a team..

## Library

Grade One students attend a 45-minute library lesson every week.

A library lesson involves a whole class story read by the teacher followed by a discussion, teaching focus, borrowing a book for home and sometimes a reading response activity.

This term we are focusing on:

- books by author Pamela Allen
- -understanding that fiction books are story books
- -characters and setting
- using a shelf marker

Grade 1GL need to bring their library bag to school on Mondays. Grade 1B and 1GL students need to bring their library bag to school on Tuesdays.

Students may borrow weekly or fortnightly.

Students require a library bag to borrow books to take home.

## Japanese

Students have started learning Japanese with Mr Gregory ('Sensei') this term. They have one 55 min lesson each week:

This year Grade 1 students will become familiar with the sounds of the Japanese language, including pronunciation and rhythm through songs and games. They will also be learning high-frequency words supported with gestures to help them begin communicating in Japanese. Students will also see that there are differences in how language is used in different cultural and social contexts, such as using more polite language with older people. The acknowledgement and sharing of "home languages" will also be a focus at times during the year.

St Ita's was chosen as a pilot school for new versions of the ELLA apps, a game-based digital learning program developed by the Federal Government for languages. Students love using this app, but unfortunately the Government has not made it available for home use yet so it can only be used at school (a number of parents have asked if they can access it at home)



## Art

This term grade one students will be learning how to follow the art room rules and stay safe within their creative space. They will learn the elements of art and how important they are to consider when creating their masterpieces.

Students will also learn what the primary and secondary colours are, and how to make secondary colours using two primary colours mixed together and will experiment with paint. Students will be introduced to the Artist Mondrian and create art work inspired by him as well as create a year level display related to colour.

## Home Reading and Homework



We ask that your child is reading every week night. Please record their reading in home reading diary provided.

Children are expected to bring their reader bags to school everyday and change their books each morning.

A simple maths task will go home each week. This will include simple number facts; revision of concepts already taught. This will go home every Wednesday and is optional.

Please contact us via class dojo if reading or Maths is difficult at home.

## Communication



Our primary form of communication is Class Dojo. This app is the main conduit for us to connect with families. Important information and alerts are posted daily, as well regular photo updates of our children learning. Class Dojo is also the preferred platform to communicate with your child's teacher.

Our school newsletter is uploaded to our Schoolzine app every Wednesday.
